Up until now, part of a well-worn cannon and a small black and white iron notice were the only clues to the historic importance of a small grassy site in Hampton's Roy Grove. It marked the arrival of triangulation as the basis of accurate mapping, and what was to become Ordnance Survey.

Until the arrival of GPS, this was the most reliable method of the craft. Our local cannon marked one end where General Roy's base line started. It ran as far as the existing site of Heathrow Airport.

Today you can read all about it on a new information board of detailed explanatory texts and maps created entirely by Claygate photographer and author **Paul Doe**. Coming across the site when his son was at nearby Hampton School, he found the cannon and the dilapidated notice, dated 1926, the 200th anniversary of General Roy's death.

An appeal to Richmond Council for a Civic Pride grant underlining its Heritage Site status took nine months to come to fruition. With funding secured Paul created the board himself. Like most such boards these days it stands about 4 feet high on stout legs, the surface angled forward for easy reading, and topped with clear plastic. As for the maps within, the specialist Charles Close Society and the Royal Society were generous, the latter providing drawings dated 1785. **MW** THS

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Obituary

Ron Smedley

With the recent death of Ron Smedley at the age of 92, Hampton has lost a remarkable character. A man who will be greatly missed, both for his personal qualities and for his valuable contributions to our community. He has been particularly involved with two local groups.

He took over as Chairman of the Hampton & Molesey Riverside Trust in 2001 and held that position for the next 11 years, helping to effect many major improvements to the condition of the riverside, notably the long neglected historic area of Bell Hill.

Garrick's Temple to Shakespeare is an important Grade 1 Listed building, created in the 1750s by the great actor David Garrick, and it was saved from a state of near dilapidation in the 1990s and restored to its original condition. Ron was one of the original trustees of the local charitable trust that was set up in 2004 to manage the Temple and the landscaped gardens in which it stands, a role he retained to the end of his life.

Whilst still in his teens, he became hooked on folk dancing and he joined the staff of the English Folk Dance and Song Society. A chance meeting with BBC producer Charles Chilton led to him getting a job with BBC Radio and when BBC Schools Television was created in 1959, he became an assistant producer. He had a glittering career at the BBC, making popular and successful programmes, including Grange Hill, winning three BAFTA awards and many other prizes. During this period he continued his involvement with folk dance, playing a major role with his partner Bob Parker in its world-wide revival, including teaching traditional forms of dance to students of the Royal Ballet School and producing seven of the EFDSS Festivals at the Royal Albert Hall. He even danced with Princess Margaret at one of these events.

Dunkirk Little Ship Lost in Fire

A casualty of the completely devastating fire at Platts Eyot in May was 'Little Ship' Lady Gay.

A 34 ft. long craft built in 1936, she was in **Tony Woollard**'s Otter Marine boatyard when an ember from a rubbish bonfire spread to his premises on Lower Sunbury Road.

"Ten of us tried to launch the Lady Gay but it was impossible" said Tony. "The fire took hold so quickly it was impossible, the fire was so fierce." As well as the Lady Gay, two more craft, Pippin and Angie, were lost.

even sift through the debris as it was just hazardous waste. "What really hurts is losing Lady Gay" he says. "This was a Dunkirk Little Ship and it's like having a child taken away".

Footnote: 700 Little Ships took part in the evacuation of Allied troops from the beaches of Dunkirk over nine days from May 26, 1940. Altogether, 338,226 servicemen, including French and Belgians, were landed in England – largely by Royal Navy warships – after the smaller craft endured bombs and strafing runs from the Luftwaffe to rescue them. **MW**

Make a Garden at Hampton Station

If you've missed a train and need to wait 30 minutes for the next one, you'd surely welcome a garden to wait in?



So believes **Tarnia Rayment**, relief ticket office clerk for Hampton railway station and customer ambassador for SW Region between here and Shepperton. She wants to put up our station for adoption, by which she means greenfingered locals taking up the cudgels – or spades or trowels. Horticultural societies and allotment associations are obvious candidates. South Western Railways and Association of Community Rail Partnerships (ACoRP) will cover the cost of plants and material.

Tarnia's already gained favourable reactions from commuters. How many of them remember Len, who worked a prizewinning garden on a plot beyond where the bike racks now stand? That was 40 years ago, and when he retired noone took it up. Now's the opportunity to make amends.

Another use for the station, Tarnia has discovered, is the Metro and Coffee Group. After fetching their daily fixes from the coffee hut, they gather on the station platform's benches to read or chat – carefully social distancing at either end. "The station's a hive of activity, not just for passengers" says Tarnia.

Venue Change for Band Concert

A combination of Covid 19 and the temporary closure of their original home at the White House means this is only the band's second outing since the pandemic hit us. With a half-full church it is expected the audience can easily observe social distancing.

Disappointment for Stables

Having already raised over £1 million to save eviction and buy their property, Park Lane Stables in Teddington has been asked to leave. As a charity, they are not allowed to meet the higher price of £1.3 million, an offer their landlord has received from another party. The current lease ran until the end of May and cannot be extended.

There are 23 horses stabled at Park Lane, where the charity Riding for the Disabled runs very successful classes for children and adults alike. Now RDA chief **Ed Brasher** hopes an alternative suitable venue can be found. In the meantime, Manor Farm Stables in Petersham has offered a temporary home to the horses.

Richmond Council Leader **Gareth Roberts** describes the situation as "sad news". He says "I hope there is some way the Council can step in and prevent the loss of this facility which contributes so much to the community and to disabled children".

PLS (to abbreviate its full name) is following Charity Commission guidelines: 'the trustees



are responsible for protecting a charity's money and assets, that the price paid for property should be fair or even discounted'. After arranging for three valuations, the highest put the value at £840,000. £1.3 million far exceeds that. But the stables could be designated an Asset of Community Value, meaning it can't be sold to anyone other than a community body before the end of July.

Another ray of hope is to designate the building as one of Townscape Merit, meaning a change of use would need planning permission – likely to be refused if housing was proposed.

Clearly, this isn't the end of the tunnel for PLS. *MW* THS
