

First it was the Royal Mail sorting office in Rosehill closing. Now Lloyds, Hampton's last surviving bank branch, is to close on 25 July. This bombshell arrived on individual customers' doormats only on Friday 1 March.

We've long been assured our Lloyds was among the bank's busiest branches because the two ATMs on its outside wall in Wensleydale Parade were in constant use. We thought our counter visits, too, were quite safe. Queues were quite common inside the branch.

But statistics, as ever, were against us: 14 million Lloyds customers now use the internet, while 10 million have mobile phones as their main contact point. Meanwhile, those of us who've obviously been spoiled by personal banking can try the Twickenham or Kingston branches instead. We'll also be able to withdraw cash at an ATM at Everydays newsagents, 72 Milton Road, only a few yards away from the old familiar haunt.

The bank has some local number-crunching information to justify its bad news, thus: 68 per cent of Hampton customers have also used other branches; 81 per cent have also used their internet banking or 'Phonebank'; and 24 per cent also use the Post Office (presumably the one in Station Road, also the last remaining of its kind in Hampton).

The leader of the council and Hampton resident, Cllr Gareth Roberts has approached the head of Group Public Affairs to see if the decision is reversible and will also be requesting help from our MP, Vince Cable, with his higher corporate contacts.

Meanwhile, our local weekly newspaper, the Richmond & Twickenham Times, featured on its front page last week the long-threatened closure of our sorting office in Rosehill. Our newsletter readers learnt about it in our summer issue last year and a 2,500-signature protest petition to Royal Mail rapidly gained popularity. We knew then March 2019 was earmarked for closure, but now we're already in the target month and no further information is forthcoming. As far as the staff are concerned, 20 will continue working for Royal Mail, while the remaining five have decided not to move with their colleagues to the much larger office in Ashford.

20 mph limit likely to go ahead

Alongside many other London boroughs, it is looking very likely that a blanket speed limit of 20mph is going to be introduced in Richmond following the agreement from

the council's Scrutiny Committee in February. The council claims

However, it does exclude the A308 between Kingston and Hampton, including Hampton Court Road, Upper Sunbury Road and Lower Sunbury Road (but includes Thames Street) as a result of the views expressed by residents in the 12 week consultation period. The A316 is also excluded

as it is managed by Transport for London.

Cllr Alexander Ehmann, Cabinet Member for Transport, Streetscene and Air Quality has said: "I understand the strong feelings on both sides of this debate. A majority of residents who took part in this consultation acknowledged that a borough-wide 20mph limit would improve road safety. The oldest and youngest in our communities were overwhelming in favour and it simply cannot be denied that the slower vehicles drive, the safer our roads become."

I attended our consultation session with the council in November and as a driver myself, I was surprised by the opposition to the lower speed limit by some of our residents. I think it is only fair that we take responsibility as car users if it improves both safety for pedestrians and cyclists and air quality for all residents.

Flight Path Changes: Quieter Skies?

The prospect of an extra 25,000 flights a year in and out of Heathrow may strike fear in our hearts. Especially as the news comes a year before the proposed third runway is built.


But the pill could be sweetened with news of a longer respite period between aircraft take-offs and landings. At present, some communities living near the airport experience half a day's break as their direction alternates in the afternoon.

With three runways, the Heathrow expansion plan sets to implement a 'mixed mode' on either the north or south (for safety reasons, never the middle). This is where planes can land and take-off on the same runway (once it is clear) and would deliver the greater capacity. Currently, each runway handles exclusively either take-offs or landings.


Hampton's lucky, though, being five miles south of Heathrow, so well below the East-West landing path. Though the new plans mean we may experience more planes taking off over Hampton, it is a fraction of the amount that our neighbouring villages have to put up with. Pity poor Richmond, Kew, Isleworth, Brentford and Hounslow lying right underneath both the major arrival and departure flightpaths.

According to HACAN, (Heathrow Association for the Control of Aircraft Noise), respite periods are likely to drop to eight hours. Chairman John Stewart believes, as the airport expands, so will the respite area. "Vast swathes of London and the Home Counties will receive a predictable break from aircraft noise for the first time as the respite areas are extended" he says. "It amounts to a near-revolution to Heathrow's flight path."


It was in June last year that MP's representing constituencies around Heathrow backed the third runway plan. Altering flight paths is one method of trying to smooth our feathers. Even so, we shall enjoy our eight hours of respite, the first-ever break from aircraft noise.



Area 3 where aircraft height is 6,500-21,000 feet above ground, frequency up to 17 flights an hour, of which 11 would exit at a noise level of 65 decibels (average level in a busy office environment).



Hampton is within Departure Area 8 where elevation is between 1,000-2,000 feet, frequency up to 17 flights an hour, of which 11 will emit 65 decibels of noise or more.



Hampton is also just within Departure Area 9, where elevation is between 3,000 and 4,000 feet, frequency up to 17 flights an hour, eight of which will emit 65 decibels or more.

We understand 68 extra flights a day could be accommodated during busy periods.

Note: Future plans for Heathrow's flight paths were covered by consultation with 30 Greater London areas in January and February this year. Hampton was included in Twickenham's consultation. THS
